

DURRANT PROJECTS RECOGNIZED FOR ENERGY EFFICIENCY

The Durrant Group recently had three building projects recognized for their energy efficiency. Alliant Energy distributed 13 awards to schools and businesses for being state leaders in energy-efficient building construction. These organizations achieved significant savings through Alliant Energy's Commercial New Construction program. Durrant was the designer for three of the projects honored at the first annual "Excellence in Energy-Efficient Construction Awards" ceremony.

Cornell College received a Silver Award for its 18.8 percent electric savings and 27.1 percent natural gas savings. Durrant's design of the Clock Tower Hall reduced carbon dioxide emissions by 110 tons per year. This is equivalent to taking 20 passenger vehicles off the road or powering 14 homes. The Washington Court project that houses the Crescent Community Health Center in Dubuque received a Gold Award for its 32 percent electric savings. Carbon dioxide emissions were reduced by 66 tons per year which is equivalent to taking 12 passenger vehicles off the road or powering 9 homes. Keokuk County Health Center in Sigourney also received a Gold Award for its 26 percent savings. Durrant provided a design which reduced carbon dioxide emissions by 233 tons. This is equivalent to taking 43 passenger vehicles off the road or powering 31 homes.
